### A Note on Guru Tegh Bahadur *ji*'s Martyrdom

Guru Tegh Bahadur *ji*, the Ninth Sikh Guru, occupies a unique and revered place in world history for his fearless stand in defence of religious freedom. His martyrdom on 24th November, 1675, in Delhi (India) was not only a spiritual act of resistance but also a defining moment in the global discourse on human rights and liberty of conscience.

#### Historical Context

During the 17th century, India was under the rule of the Mughal Emperor, Aurangzeb, whose reign was marked by aggressive policies of religious conformity. A campaign of forced conversions was launched, targeting non-Muslim communities. The Kashmiri Pandits, a learned and devout Hindu community, faced severe persecution and were given a choice to either convert to Islam or face death.

Finally, Guru Tegh Bahadur *ji* was publicly beheaded at Chandni Chowk, Delhi. His martyrdom ignited a spirit of resistance and righteousness that would shape the Sikh ethos forever.

#### Legacy and Relevance

Guru Tegh Bahadur *ji*'s sacrifice was a selfless act to uphold the dignity of others' beliefs—a rare and noble gesture in any era. He became a martyr not for his own faith, but for the faith of others, making him a universal symbol of interfaith solidarity and moral courage.
